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A Letter from the President

In her latest column appearing in the New York Times, AFT President Randi Weingarten talks about the vital role a highquality education system can play in giving students much needed skills and knowledge as well as stabilizing our communities and strengthening the economy.

As Congress debates the future of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, originally signed by President Lyndon B. Johnson as part of the War on Poverty, this is the time to ensure that the law refocuses on its original purpose: leveling the playing field for kids. " The law's most recent iteration. No Child Left Behind, in emphasizing testing, pulled us away from the focus on kids, especially those who are poor." Weingarten writes

Part of that renewed focus, she stresses, has to be on narrowing the achievement gap. "We narrow that gap through supporting, not sanctioning, kids teachers and schools.

We narrow that gap through teaching kids how to work with their hands, to work in teams, to solve problems --not just how to ace a test. We narrow the gap by provide early childhood education and helping all third graders read at level. We narrow that gap when we give all kids, not just the wealthier families, access to art and music, librarians and nurses. We narrow the gap by focusing on high poverty schools that struggle and helping these schools through interventions like wraparound services that combat the impact of poverty.

The result is a high quality public education system that can unlock children's potential, She says. Such a system can bring communities by Jack Beyer



together and ensure a top notch workforce for our economy.

A report released this week from the White House found that this bill would cap "spending for the next six years at \$800 million lower than it was in 2012." This would happen at a time when child poverty rates are alarmingly high and when Title I has failed to see any increase since 2012. The report also found that high poverty districts could lose \$700million, while more affluent districts could gain \$470 million.

We have an opportunity with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act reauthorization to help reclaim the promise of Public education.

Applications for all extracurricular positions are due in the office of the Superintendent or designee by April 15th. The Board of Education's decision for the following school year will be made no later than the last week in May. (reference Schedule A)

Applications for all grade level chairs and department chairs shall be submitted to the office of the Building Principal, Superintendent, or his/her designee by May 1st. Appointments to all positions will be made not later than June 15th. (refer to Article 5 on page 6-7)

APPR

Review the APPR Timeline. Monitor student progress and collect evidence. Refer to Appendix G and H for types of evidence.

Governor Cuomo's APPR Proposals

These proposals could become your reality! Download the MAC App on your phone and fax your legislators to let them know this is NOT how we should be evaluated!

Annual Professional Performance Reviews

- 1. **50%** of the APPR evaluation will be based on the state test score, and the remaining 50% on observations. (*He recommends 35% of this come from independent observations while 15% from local supervisors.*)
- Rather than districts setting their own scoring band cutoffs, *the state will now set the scoring bands* for the student growth measure and the observation portion of the score at the state level.
- 3. If a teacher is rated ineffective in either portion of the score, he or she may not be rated effective or highly effective. Any teacher who is rated ineffective for two years in a row, will be dismissed.
- 4. Tenure will only be granted when a teacher achieves *five consecutive years of effective or highly effective ratings.*




Jacqueline Woodson has written many novels for teenagers which can be found in the high school library. She will be at the Book Festival on May 2nd if you wish to meet her.


